Transit Access Fund

BACKGROUND

The presence and condition of non-motorized infrastructure significantly impacts Whatcom County residents' ability to access transit safely and comfortably. Improving and expanding multimodal transportation networks may foster increased transit ridership, improves the overall transit experience, and benefits residents who use alternatives to motorized travel. Currently, many Whatcom Transportation Authority (WTA) bus stops lack safe and convenient access to neighboring residences, businesses, medical facilities, social services, and other destinations. This presents a significant safety and equity issue within our communities, as many individuals require the presence of appropriate infrastructure to get to their destinations. Effectively addressing the issue of transit access within Whatcom County will help our community achieve goals surrounding improved transportation options, traffic safety, transportation equity, sustainability, and public health.

WTA is offering a creative and flexible approach to providing financial assistance for local multi-modal transportation projects through its Transit Access Fund (TAF). The TAF provides financial assistance to qualifying infrastructure projects that are located within a quarter mile walking distance of any WTA bus stop. Any non-motorized infrastructure project funded through the TAF must provide safe and comfortable access to WTA facilities and enhance overall conditions for those who secure such access by walking, biking, and/or rolling.

OVERVIEW OF PROCESS

Government organizations serving Whatcom County, including local, state, and tribal governments are eligible to apply. Given the limited amount of funding available through the TAF, an application must be submitted for each project, which will be evaluated and scored by a committee of WTA staff.

For the 2022 calendar year, WTA has budgeted \$300,000 to be awarded to eligible projects with a maximum award of up to \$100,000 for any selected project, unless there are fewer than three eligible recipients, in which case WTA can decide to provide more than the maximum award. Funds will be allocated in WTA's discretion, and generally based on WTA staff application evaluations, estimated project construction costs, anticipated project

execution and completion timeline, and geographic distribution. A local match of at least 10% of the costs associated to the construction of the eligible non-motorized infrastructure is required. Funding will be made through a competitive process and is not guaranteed.

Award recipients will be required to enter into a Contract with WTA, and, at a minimum, submit regular status reports and provide a walkthrough inspection upon completion. WTA reserves the right to require additional reporting, inspections, or any other information to ensure project success and contract adherence.

WTA will award the funds as a reimbursement of pre-approved costs actually paid, upon completion of the project, provided that all WTA conditions of approval of the award are met. The failure by any awarded party to comply with all contract requirements or conditions shall entitle WTA the discretion to rescind its award.

ELIGIBILITY RULES/REQUIREMENTS & SELECTION CRITERIA

A. ELIGIBILITY RULES AND REQUIREMENTS

- Proposals must be submitted and the underlying project managed by a recognized state, local, or tribal governmental entity.
- Projects must be located within a quarter mile of an existing WTA stop or station (Stop proximity buffers can be displayed in the [TAF Webmap](#)).
- Projects must not adjoin a parcel that is subject to an active or pending development application.
- Projects must either:
 1. Provide a non-motorized infrastructure improvement at a WTA bus stop or station,
 2. Provide a connection to existing non-motorized infrastructure with continuous pedestrian access to a WTA stop or station, or
 3. Improve existing non-motorized infrastructure with continuous pedestrian access to a WTA bus stop or station.
- Eligible project types include, but are not limited to: sidewalks, intersection improvements, mid-block crossings, curb cuts, sidewalk ramps, shared-use paths, pedestrian crossing signals, bicycle parking, and bicycle and pedestrian lighting.
- Ineligible project types include, but are not limited to, on-street bicycle lanes, shared lane marking, paved shoulders, bicycle boxes, and landscaping only type projects.
- Projects must meet ADA standards. Where possible, projects involving sidewalk installation or improvements at a WTA bus stop must include the installation of a 5'x8' ADA bus boarding pad.
- Applicants must acknowledge funding from WTA on any public communications for the project (newsletters, websites, email blasts, etc.), as follows: "This project funded in part by the Whatcom Transportation Authority."
- Applicants must complete each section of the application.

B. SELECTION PROCESS

Selection Committee

A committee of WTA staff will review and evaluate the eligible applications based on the criteria below. WTA reserves the right to request additional information and/or a meeting with the applicant to properly evaluate a submission.

Improved Access – How well does the proposed project improve the conditions for non-motorized access to WTA bus stops and/or stations? Does the proposed project improve access for priority populations (i.e., low-income households, zero-vehicle households, senior populations, individuals living with a disability, etc.)? What risks are identified and what is the risk mitigation plan for those risks?

Community Need – Does the proposed project address an identified transportation barrier or gap? Has the proposed project been identified in existing plans or programs? How does the project align with the TAF goals?

Ability to Fund and Administer – Does the applicant demonstrate the ability to fully fund and administer the project if awarded financial assistance through the TAF? Is there significant detail outlining the applicant's ability to complete the project? Is the project ready for execution or is it still in the planning phases?

Clarity and Quality of Application – Is the application clear, legible, and complete including proper spelling, grammar, and punctuation? Does the applicant include the appropriate data and documentation needed to support the proposed project? Is there significant enough detail for staff to evaluate the application properly and completely for competitive award?

History and Geographic Diversity - In addition to the above specific criteria, geographic distribution, diversity in population groups served and previous grant award(s) will be considered in evaluating the application.

Public Disclosure Law (RCW 32.56)

WTA complies with RCW Chapter 42.56. All proposals, supporting documentation, Contract documents, and reports will be disclosed if a Public Disclosure Request (PDR) is submitted, unless a proper exception applies. It is the Applicants responsibility to be familiar with RCW Chapter 42.56 and what WTA's confidentiality limitations are.

WTA will not execute non-disclosure agreements.




